

Maintenance Tips for Each Roof Type

Concrete & Terracotta Tiles

Avoid walking on slate unless you are trained or using proper safety equipment, as they can be brittle and easily cracked.

Tips for All Roof Types

- Schedule professional inspections every 2–3 years to identify issues before they escalate.
- Trim overhanging branches to prevent damage from falling limbs or excess debris.
- Ensure proper attic ventilation to reduce heat and moisture buildup, which can affect roofing materials.
- Address small repairs promptly to avoid costly replacements.
